

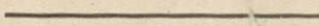

HISTORICAL.

NOTES.

I. COMPOSITION OF THE NEW ZEALAND EXPEDITIONARY FORCE.

1. *Main Body.*

On 30th July, 1914, preliminary arrangements were made in New Zealand for the preparation of a voluntary Expeditionary Force for service in Europe (or elsewhere). The New Zealand Government offered this Force to the Imperial Government. This offer was accepted on 12th August.

The composition of the New Zealand Expeditionary Force as originally designed was based on discussions which the Hon. Minister of Defence, Sir James Allen, and Major-General Sir A. W. Robin, then Dominion Military Representative Imperial General Staff at the War Office, had held with the Army Council in 1913. It provided for the following units:—

Mounted Rifle Brigade (with attached troops not allotted to a Cavalry Division), consisting of—

(N.B.—The H.A. Battery to be provided by the Imperial Government.)

Infantry Brigade, consisting of—

Headquarters.

4 Infantry Battalions.

Artillery, consisting of—

1 Field Battery (6 guns) and No. 1 Section Ammunition Column.

1 Section Divisional Ammunition Column.

Signal Unit, consisting of 3 Sections Signal Company with a Division (H.Q. Section and Nos. 1 and 2 Sections).

Train, consisting of 1 Company Divisional Train.³

Medical, consisting of 1 Field Ambulance.

Independent Unit, consisting of 1 Mounted Rifle Regiment.

Line of Communication Units, consisting of—

Army Pay Department.

Headquarters, General Base Depot.

The composition of the original Main Body was not that which eventually sailed, as, instead of sending one battery with sections of various Horse, Field, and Divisional Ammunition Columns, it was decided to equip and despatch a whole Field Artillery Brigade and one Field Artillery Brigade Ammunition Column, with a Howitzer Battery of four guns to follow with the Second Reinforcement six weeks later.

The force which actually sailed was composed as under:—

2. Additional Units formed in Egypt.

(a.) The following additional units were formed in Egypt in December, 1914, from troops raised at New Zealand expense in the United Kingdom, and from reinforcements to the New Zealand Expeditionary Force from the Dominion:—

Divisional Artillery—

Divisional Ammunition Column. (The full personnel for this unit, with 10 per cent. of establishment as 1st Reinforcement, was despatched from New Zealand with the 7th Reinforcements).

“A” Howitzer Battery Ammunition Column (for No. 4 Howitzer Battery).

No. 2 Brigade Ammunition Column.

No. 3 Brigade Ammunition Column.

Divisional Engineers—

Headquarters.

No. 1 Field Company, New Zealand Engineers.

Divisional Train—

No. 2 (New Zealand Infantry Brigade) Company.

No. 3 (New Zealand Mounted Rifles Brigade) Company.

(b.) On 28th January, 1916, the Imperial Government suggested that, in view of the large accumulation of reinforcements in Egypt, a complete New Zealand Division be formed. At the suggestion of the Army Council details were arranged direct with General Sir William Birdwood, and the Division was formed in February, 1916.

On the reorganization of the Expeditionary Force in January, 1916, into a Division as given in Table III, the following additional new units were raised in Egypt from the personnel existing and reinforcements:—

Divisional Engineers—

Nos. 2 and 3 Field Companies.

Divisional Artillery—

2nd and 3rd Field Artillery Brigades, consisting of 8 batteries each of four 18-pr. guns.

1 Battery of three 4.5" Howitzers.

1st F.A. Brigade increased by 1 Battery.

2nd New Zealand Infantry Brigade—

Headquarters.

4 Battalions.

Pioneer Battalion.

Divisional Transport and Supply Units—

1 Workshop (A.S.C.) for ambulance-cars.

1 Field Bakery.

1 Field Butchery.

5 Depot Units of Supply.

Divisional Medical Units—

1 Field Ambulance.

1 Sanitary Section.

(c.) Resulting from the organization of the Expeditionary Force into a Division, the Otago Mounted Rifle Regiment (26 officers, 523 other ranks) was reduced from a Mounted Rifle Regiment to a Mounted Rifle Squadron (6 officers, 151 other ranks) and incorporated in the Division as Divisional Mounted Troops, the excess personnel being transferred to the various new units of the Division.

On the reorganization of the Expeditionary Force into a Division, the Engineer Field Troop (3 officers, 74 other ranks) was disbanded, the personnel being absorbed by transfer into the new Engineer Field Company (6 officers, 211 other ranks). The two Veterinary Sections despatched on 14th December, 1914, were also disbanded, and the personnel absorbed into the two Mobile Veterinary Sections attached, one to New Zealand Division, and the other to New Zealand Mounted Rifle Brigade.

(d.) On the formation in February, 1916, of the New Zealand Division, the New Zealand Mounted Rifle Brigade, with New Zealand Mounted Rifle Brigade Field Ambulance and No. 2 Mobile Veterinary Section, remained as a separate Mounted Rifle Brigade.

On 24th July and 17th October, 1916, two Camel Companies (consisting each of 6 officers and 177 other ranks) were formed in Egypt from Mounted Rifle Reinforcements.

On 3rd June, 1918, advice was received from the General Officer Commanding New Zealand Expeditionary Force in Egypt that the War Office desired to form the two New Zealand Camel Companies into a Mounted Rifle Regiment, and on 7th June a communication was sent to His Excellency the Governor-General, for transmission to the Army Council, stating the New Zealand Government were prepared to sanction the proposal. On 9th July the General Officer Commanding New Zealand Expeditionary Force in the United Kingdom stated that the War Office had, on representations from General Godley, decided that only a Machine-gun Squadron (establishment 8 officers, 221 other ranks) should be formed. This was agreed to by the New Zealand Government.

The Camel Companies were disbanded as from 31st July, 1918, and Machine-gun Squadron formed on same date.

In October, 1916, a Brigade Machine-gun Squadron, consisting of 8 officers and 221 other ranks, was formed in Egypt from Mounted Rifle Reinforcements.

On 17th July, 1917, the Commandant Administrative Headquarters in Egypt asked that the New Zealand Government consent to the formation of one Training Company, Army Service Corps (4 officers, 55 other ranks), from Mounted Rifles Reinforcements. The New Zealand Government on 2nd August, 1917, approved of the formation of this unit.

On 26th July, 1917, a Field Troop of Engineers was formed in Egypt from selected men of the New Zealand Mounted Rifle Brigade, the establishment of this troop being 2 officers and 42 other ranks. No reinforcements were provided for this additional unit.

On 21st May, 1918, advice was received from the Imperial Government that, in consequence of the disbandment of the Cavalry Divisional Signal Squadron in Mesopotamia, the personnel of the New Zealand Mounted Signal Troop, consisting of 2 officers and 96 men, were to be sent to France as reinforcements.

In January, 1918, British Divisions were reduced from twelve to nine battalions of Infantry each. Owing to there being a sufficient supply of reinforcements in hand this reduction was not brought into force in regard to the New Zealand Division, which accordingly became the strongest Division in the Allied Armies until the conclusion of the armistice.

3. *New Units in United Kingdom and France.*

1. On 25th July, 1916, the Imperial Government asked the New Zealand Government to raise and maintain personnel for an additional 4.5 in. Q.F. Howitzer Battery to complete the organization of the Divisional Artillery of the New Zealand Division, the establishment to be 4 officers and 134 other ranks. The personnel for this battery was found from accumulated reinforcements in the United Kingdom.

2. In September, 1916, 1 Heavy, 3 Medium, and 6 Light Trench-mortar Batteries (21 officers, 273 other ranks) were formed in the United Kingdom from reinforcements to the New Zealand Division.

3. On 18th October, 1916, authority was given to form a new (4th) Machine-gun Company for the New Zealand Division in the United Kingdom from reinforcements to the New Zealand Division (establishment 10 officers, 144 other ranks).

4. On 29th January, 1917, advice was received that a Railway Operating Section was being formed in France, with an establishment of 3 officers and 269 other ranks, personnel found from category B men (temporarily unfit). This unit was maintained and reinforced from category B men, therefore no reinforcements were being provided from New Zealand.

5. In March, 1917, at the urgent request of the Imperial Government, a new (4th) Infantry Brigade (with an establishment of 173 officers, 4,604 other ranks) was formed in the United Kingdom from reinforcements, on the distinct understanding that its formation would not involve additional reinforcements being provided. The personnel of this brigade to be utilized as reinforcements for the New Zealand Division if required. This brigade was in February, 1918, absorbed into reinforcements.

6. On 5th April, 1918, the Imperial Government requested that a Tank Battalion be formed from New Zealand reinforcements in the United Kingdom. The New Zealand Government agreed to this, also to despatch 600 additional reinforcements in the ensuing four months to replace the personnel taken to form the unit. This proposal involved the sending of 39 additional other ranks per four-weekly draft (i.e. 7 per cent. per month). On 29th June, 1918, advice was received from London that the formation of the Tank Battalion was not to be proceeded with. Subsequently the question was again raised, but definite action had not been taken prior to the signing of the Armistice.

7. On 28th June, 1918, in consequence of cabled report in the Press that 251 casualties had occurred in the Entrenching Battalion, the General Officer Commanding New Zealand Troops in the United Kingdom was asked for particulars regarding the formation of this battalion. On 8th July a cable was received from that officer stating that all New Zealand reinforcements in France were in February, 1918, on the absorption of the 4th Brigade, organized into three Entrenching Battalions, and were at date of cable so organized, but when surplus numbers absorbed they formed an Entrenching Group, strength one battalion.

8. Advice was received on 13th June, 1918, that the New Zealand Machine-gun Companies in France had been formed into a Machine-gun Battalion, but that no additional reinforcements would be required for this new formation.

4. *New Units formed in New Zealand during Gallipoli Campaign.*

The following new units were formed in New Zealand in response to requests conveyed through the Imperial Government:—

Veterinary Services—

2 Mobile Veterinary Sections (2 officers, 26 other ranks)	} Raised in November, 1914, and despatched with 2nd Reinforcements on 14th December, 1918
2 Veterinary Sections (4 officers, 226 other ranks)	

Divisional Artillery—

No. 5 Field Battery of four 18-pr. guns (5 officers, 141 other ranks.) Raised in February, 1915, and despatched with 4th Reinforcements on 17th April, 1915.

Divisional Engineers—

No. 2 Field Company, New Zealand Engineers (6 officers, 211 other ranks). Raised in February, 1915, and despatched with 4th Reinforcements on 17th April, 1915.

Divisional Train—

No. 4 Company (5 officers, 80 other ranks). Raised in February, 1915, and despatched with 4th Reinforcements on 17th April, 1915.

The following new units were offered by the New Zealand Government and were accepted by the Imperial Government:—

Divisional Artillery—

No. 4 4.5 in. Howitzer Battery (5 officers, 141 other ranks). Raised in November, 1914, and despatched with 2nd Reinforcements on 14th December, 1914.

Headquarters, 2nd Field Artillery Brigade (1 officer, 38 other ranks). Raised in February, 1915, and despatched with 4th Reinforcements.

No. 6 4-5 in. Howitzer Battery (5 officers, 141 other ranks). Raised in April, 1915, and despatched with 5th Reinforcements on 13th June, 1915.

"B" Howitzer Battery Ammunition Column (1 officer, 40 other ranks). Raised in April, 1915, and despatched with 5th Reinforcements on 13th June, 1915.

New Zealand Rifle Brigade—

Headquarters (3 officers, 21 other ranks). Raised in June, 1915; part despatched with 7th Reinforcements, part with 3rd and 4th Battalions.

1st and 2nd Battalions (58 officers, 1,992 other ranks). Raised in June, 1915, and despatched with 7th Reinforcements on 9th October, 1915.

3rd and 4th Battalions (58 officers, 1,992 other ranks). Raised in October, 1915, and despatched in February, 1916.

Divisional Signal Service—

I Section Signal Company (1 officer, 26 other ranks), attached to New Zealand Rifle Brigade. Raised in June, 1915, and despatched with 7th Reinforcements on 9th October, 1915.

Divisional Medical Units—

No. 2 New Zealand Field Ambulance (10 officers, 182 other ranks). Section B, raised June, 1915, despatched with 7th Reinforcements; Sections A and C, raised October, 1915, despatched with 3rd and 4th Battalions.

New Zealand General Hospital (8 officers, 86 other ranks). Raised in April, 1915, and despatched with 5th Reinforcements as No. 2 Stationary Hospital; subsequently augmented to New Zealand General Hospital, Egypt.

Hospital Ship "Maheno" (7 officers, 61 other ranks). Sailed June, 1915.

Hospital Ship "Marama" (10 officers, 67 other ranks). Sailed December, 1915.

No. 1 Stationary Hospital. Raised in March, 1916, and despatched in May, 1916. (Establishment, 8 officers, 86 other ranks.)

A Cyclist Company being included in the composition of a Division, the New Zealand Government, in March, 1916, offered to provide the personnel for such a company. The offer was accepted by the Imperial Government. The officers and men of this company were found by voluntary transfers from the Mounted Rifle units in training at that time. The company was despatched in May, 1916, with the 12th Reinforcements.

II. REINFORCEMENTS.

1. In accordance with the discussions held with the Army Council prior to the outbreak of war, arrangements were made to provide reinforcements to the New Zealand Expeditionary Force on the following basis:—

(a.) 10 per cent. of Establishment of all arms to accompany Main Body.

(b.) 20 per cent. of Establishment of all arms to sail six weeks after the departure of the Main Body.

(c.) 5 per cent. of Establishment of all arms monthly thereafter.

2. The 1st and 2nd Reinforcements were provided on this basis, the 2nd Reinforcements being despatched in December, 1914, eight weeks after the sailing of the Main Body, which was accompanied by 1st Reinforcements.

3. Subsequent reinforcement drafts were despatched at intervals of two months.

4. Arrangements were originally made to provide the 3rd Reinforcements on the basis of 5 per cent. of Establishment of all arms. But as a result of experience of three months of war the Imperial Government on 10th November, 1914, requested that reinforcements be supplied by New Zealand at the following rates:—

Infantry and Mounted Rifles—25 per cent. of Establishment per month.

Artillery—7 per cent. of Establishment per month.

Other units—as laid down in Field Service Regulations, Part II, section 28, viz.:—

Engineers—40 per cent. of Establishment per annum.

Headquarters, Administrative Services and Departments—30 per cent. of Establishment per annum.

Headquarters, Administrative Services and Departments on the lines of communication—20 per cent. of Establishment per annum.

These percentages to include 1st Reinforcements.

To meet this increased demand arrangements were put in hand to prepare a draft of approximately 3,000 every two months.

5. On the 8th December, 1914, the Imperial Government notified that reinforcements might be calculated as follows:—

Mounted Rifles—10 per cent. of Establishment per month.

Infantry—15 per cent. of Establishment per month.

Other units—As laid down in Field Service Regulations, Part II, section 28.

6. The 3rd Reinforcements were eventually despatched on this basis in regard to Mounted Rifles and Infantry, no reinforcements being sent with this draft for units of other arms of the Main Body. The reason for this was that the men under training for the Artillery, Engineers, and Army Service Corps were utilized respectively to find the personnel of the No. 6 (Howitzer) Battery, No. 2 Field Company, New Zealand Engineers, and No. 4 Company, Divisional Train.

7. Owing to the lack of technical equipment for training purposes in the Dominion arrangements were made to complete the provision of the first year's reinforcements for Artillery, Engineers, and

Signal Service with the 4th and 5th Reinforcements, upon the understanding that further training would be given to the men of these arms at the base before sending them to the front.

8. As new units were from time to time added to the Expeditionary Force the reinforcement drafts were accordingly increased.

9. The 4th and 5th Reinforcements were provided on the basis of percentages of establishments as notified in December, 1914, by the Imperial Government. These drafts included approximately 500 officers and men of the original Samoan Expeditionary Force.

10. In view of the heavy casualties suffered by the New Zealand Mounted Rifles, who were fighting as Infantry on the Gallipoli Peninsula, the New Zealand Government, on the 19th June, 1915, offered to bring the reinforcements to the Mounted Rifles from the beginning of the war to date from 10 per cent. of Establishment per month to 15 per cent. of Establishment per month (the rate of Infantry reinforcements), and to continue reinforcements on the increased scale so long as the Mounted Rifles were being used as Infantry. This offer was accepted by the Imperial Government.

With the 6th and 7th Reinforcement drafts, therefore, the Mounted Rifles reinforcements were provided at the rate of 15 per cent. of Establishment per month. Sufficient numbers of Mounted Rifles reinforcements were also sent with these drafts to make the increase from 10 per cent. to 15 per cent. per month retrospective to the 2nd Reinforcements, inclusive.

In order to meet these unforeseen requirements it was impossible to give the Mounted Rifles sailing with these drafts a sufficient period of training in New Zealand. Arrangements were therefore made for these details to take charge of the horses, which had been left in Egypt, while completing their training, thus releasing trained men for service at the front.

11. In view of the additional numbers required to make up previous drafts at the increased percentage it was impossible to train sufficient Mounted Rifemen in time to despatch the 8th Reinforcements, which sailed one month earlier than was originally intended.

12. Special requests were received from time to time throughout the Gallipoli campaign for extra reinforcements to various units, particularly Field Engineers, Army Service Corps, and Medical units, and steps were taken to supply these demands.

13. With the 9th Reinforcements 40 per cent. of Establishment of Mounted Rifles was despatched, thus providing the increase from 10 per cent. to 15 per cent. per month for the 8th and 9th Reinforcements. Reinforcements to all other arms were provided on the same basis as previous drafts.

14. Having regard to requests of the Imperial Government, received on the 9th September, 1915, for extra reinforcements, and for the acceleration of the despatch of drafts, the New Zealand Government made arrangements to send the 8th Reinforcements one month instead of two months after the departure of the 7th Reinforcements. It was also decided, at the direct request of the Imperial Government, to despatch the 9th Reinforcements a month earlier than was originally intended. The 10th Reinforcements were also called up a month earlier than had been previously decided upon, and arrangements were made to despatch subsequent reinforcement drafts at intervals of one month from the sailing of the 10th Reinforcements.

15. On 18th September, 1915, the New Zealand Government asked the Imperial Government if reinforcements would be required at a higher rate during 1916. In reply, the Imperial Government indicated, on 5th October, 1915, that the following rates of reinforcements would be required during 1916:—

- Mounted Rifles—20 per cent. of Establishment per month.
- Artillery (gunners only)—20 per cent. of Establishment per month.
- Engineers and Signal Service—20 per cent. of Establishment per month.
- Infantry—20 per cent. of Establishment per month.
- Other arms—7 per cent. of Establishment per month.

In order to meet any special demands the Imperial Government asked that a Reserve of 10 per cent. of Establishment should be maintained in New Zealand. The New Zealand Government immediately made arrangements accordingly to supply reinforcements on this basis, commencing with the 10th Reinforcements, sailing in March, 1916, and to maintain a Reserve of Mounted Rifles and Infantry in the Dominion.

16. The 10th Reinforcements were despatched on the above basis.

17. In consequence of a special request, received in March, 1916, from General Sir William Birdwood, in connection with the reorganization of the New Zealand Expeditionary Force that Mounted Rifles reinforcements be reduced and Infantry reinforcements increased forthwith, steps were taken to send the Mounted Rifles reinforcements for the 11th, 12th, 13th, and 14th Reinforcement drafts at the reduced percentage, the surplus mounted men available being transferred to Infantry which were accordingly increased.

18. The New Zealand Expeditionary Force at the front being reorganized into an Infantry Division and a Mounted Rifles Brigade, with a Mounted Signal Troop, a Mounted Rifles Brigade Field Ambulance, and one Mobile Veterinary Section attached (*vide* Table III), the Imperial Government, on 11th February, 1916, notified that reinforcements on the following basis would suffice:—

- Mounted Rifles—6 per cent. of Establishment per month.
- Artillery—3 per cent. of Establishment per month.
- Engineers and Signal Service—4 per cent. of Establishment per month.
- Infantry—15 per cent. of Establishment per month.

No rates of reinforcements for other arms were specified by the Imperial Government. The New Zealand Government, therefore, in communication with General Sir William Birdwood, arranged to supply them on the original basis—viz., that laid down in Field Service Regulation, Part II, Section 28—the Imperial Government concurring.

The new organization took effect from the 15th Reinforcements inclusive.

19. In response to a request received from the Imperial Government on 27th October, 1916, reinforcements for Medical Corps units serving with the New Zealand Division were increased from 21 to 37 per draft, commencing with the 20th Reinforcements—viz., from 2½ per cent. to 4 per cent. per month.

20. On 17th July, 1917, the New Zealand Government asked the Imperial Government if, in view of experience gained with active warfare from March, 1916, to date, the Imperial authorities considered the percentage as agreed upon in March, 1916, should be maintained or modified in any way. On 4th August the Imperial authorities replied asking that reinforcements be sent in future as under: Mounted Rifles, 6 per cent. per month; Field Artillery, 3 per cent. per month; Field Engineers, 3 per cent. per month; Tunnelling Company, 10 per cent. per month; Divisional Signallers, 3 per cent. per month; Infantry, 12 per cent. per month; Army Service Corps, 2½ per cent. per month; Medical Corps (New Zealand Division), 4 per cent. per month; Veterinary Corps, 1½ per cent. per month; Postal Corps, 1½ per cent. per month; Wireless Troop, 20 per cent. per month. This entailed a reduction in Engineers and Signallers from 4 per cent. to 3 per cent. per month, and Infantry from 15 per cent. to 12 per cent. per month. To this the New Zealand Government agreed, the new percentages to take effect from the 30th Reinforcements onwards.

21. At the request of the General Officer Commanding New Zealand Expeditionary Force, received on 14th August, 1917, the reinforcements to the New Zealand Medical Corps serving with the New Zealand Mounted Brigade in Egypt were increased from 2½ per cent. to 8 per cent. per month, commencing with the 29th Mounted Rifle draft.

22. On 27th August, 1917, the New Zealand Government decided that members of the Main Body and reinforcements who had three years' service be returned to New Zealand on furlough; the period away from the front to be as follows: two months' voyage to New Zealand, two months' furlough in New Zealand, and two months' return voyage. Those who did not wish to return to New Zealand to be granted two months' furlough in United Kingdom or south of France. The New Zealand Government undertook to provide sufficient extra reinforcements to permit of this arrangement being carried out. The Imperial Government concurred. The above arrangement was to be operative in the case of troops serving in Egypt and Mesopotamia. Owing to grave difficulties arising, however, the scheme was subsequently abandoned at the request of the Imperial Government.

23. On 26th November, 1917, as the Field Artillery held in reserve in the United Kingdom was 700, whereas the establishment to be maintained as a reserve was 350 only, it was decided that the 34th Field Artillery Reinforcements (originally 33rd) embark on due date, and that the remaining three drafts in camp be sent only as required in accordance with fluctuating numbers held in reserve in the United Kingdom.

24. On 6th December, 1917, a cable was received from Brigadier-General Richardson stating that no more reinforcements for Mechanical Transport were required. This entailed a reduction from each Army Service Corps reinforcement draft to the New Zealand Division, taking effect from the 35th Reinforcements. On 22nd December the Imperial authorities were advised that the General Officer Commanding in charge of Administration, New Zealand Expeditionary Force, London, had on 15th December recommended that no further Army Service Corps reinforcements be sent from New Zealand, to permit of transfers from Infantry in the United Kingdom of men wounded twice and three times, but who were still fit for active service, and asked if the Army Council approved the proposal, and whether the usual Army Service Corps reinforcements should be sent forward in future. On 7th January the Imperial authorities cabled that this course was approved. Accordingly, of the two Army Service Corps drafts in camp, one (36th) was sent with the 35th Reinforcements to the New Zealand Division, and the personnel of the other (38th) was absorbed by transfer into other arms. From the 37th Reinforcements inclusive the usual number of Army Service Corps reinforcements were added to the Infantry reinforcements (800 Infantry plus 31 for Tunnelling Company and 19 in place of Army Service Corps = 850).

25. On 7th September, 1917, the rate of Infantry Reinforcements was reduced, at the request of the Imperial Government, from 12 per cent. to 10 per cent. per month, commencing with the 31st Reinforcements. (The 30th Reinforcement draft was the only one sent with Infantry at 12 per cent., the 31st, 32nd, and 33rd Reinforcement drafts being sent with Infantry at 10 per cent. per month.)

26. On 28th November, 1917, the number of Infantry reinforcements were reduced, at the request of the Imperial Government, from 1,266 per draft to 831 (including 31 Tunnelling Company reinforcements), to take effect from the 34th Reinforcements inclusive. This was equal to a reduction of from 10 per cent. to 6½ per cent. per month. The reduction was caused owing to the personnel of the 4th Brigade becoming available as reinforcements to the New Zealand Division.

27. On 26th April, 1918, Headquarters, New Zealand Expeditionary Force, Cairo, stated that owing to accumulation of reinforcements to the New Zealand Medical Corps in Egypt no further reinforcements to that corps were required until further advice sent. Steps were taken to give effect to this recommendation.

28. On 6th April, 1918, owing to the critical situation in Europe, and at the request of the Imperial Government, it was decided to double the strength of the Infantry reinforcements (i.e., from 800 to 1,600 per draft) for five drafts, 36th to 40th Reinforcements inclusive.

29. On 29th July, 1918, owing to casualties having been much less than estimated and to accumulation of reinforcements in the United Kingdom, it was decided to revert to four-weekly drafts of 800 Infantry (with 31 for Tunnelling Company reinforcements and 19 in lieu of Army Service Corps reinforcements) from August inclusive.

30. On 14th May, 1918, a communication was sent to the Imperial Government stating that a telegram had been received from the General Officer Commanding New Zealand Mounted Rifles Brigade in Egypt suggesting that War Office approval be obtained to reduce temporarily Mounted

Rifle drafts 50 per cent. whilst large numbers of reinforcements were available in Egypt. On 13th June advice was received from the Imperial authorities that Mounted Rifle drafts should be dropped in July and August, and that in future reinforcements at the rate of 120 other ranks per month be furnished thereafter. Accordingly it was arranged that, as a draft had already sailed in June, there should be no further embarkation until September, but as transport accommodation was available in August a Mounted Rifle draft was despatched in that month in lieu of September. As transport became available in October, and it was anticipated that no further opportunity to despatch Mounted Rifle troops would occur until well into the New Year, four Mounted Rifle drafts were sent in October.

31. On 5th July, 1918, in consequence of advice received from Headquarters, New Zealand Expeditionary Force in Egypt, that no further reinforcements for Army Service Corps and Veterinary Corps should be sent for the New Zealand Mounted Rifle Brigade, as the men required for these corps were drawn from those who became unfit for hard riding but were fit for the two corps mentioned. The opinion of the Army Council was asked. On 13th July a telegram was received stating that the Army Council concurred in the suggestion that no more reinforcements for the two branches named should be sent.

32. On 12th August, 1918, advice was received that, in consequence of the personnel of the Wireless Troop, which was being transferred to France, being utilized as reinforcements to New Zealand Signal units, no reinforcements to the Divisional Signallers would be required until January, 1919.

III. SAMOAN EXPEDITIONARY FORCE.

1. *Composition of Samoan Expeditionary Force (Advance Party).*

In accordance with the request of the War Office, the New Zealand Government despatched a Force to Samoa in August, 1914, upon the outbreak of war. The composition of this Force was as set out in Appendix C, "Establishment of Samoan Expeditionary Force, Advance Party."

2. *Reduction of Samoan Garrison.*

In December, 1914, in consequence of the destruction of the German Fleet in the Pacific, it was decided by the Imperial Government that the garrison at Samoa could be reduced.

To effect this reduction the original Force of occupation, with the exception of Administrative Staff, was returned to New Zealand, and a Relief Force, composed of men over the age-limit for active service in Europe (strength, 13 officers, 345 other ranks), was despatched to Samoa in March, 1915.

In December, 1915, the Samoan Garrison was still further reduced to about a strength of 200, inclusive of Administrative Staff, and in August, 1916, a further alteration was made (see Appendix F), at which it was maintained up to 12th November, 1918. Reinforcements were sent from time to time as required.

IV. MAORI EXPEDITIONARY FORCE.

1. In September, 1914, the New Zealand Government, instigated by representatives of the Maori race, offered to the Imperial Government a Maori Force, strength 500. It was proposed to send half this Force to Samoa and half to Egypt for garrison duty. This offer was accepted, and the Maoris concentrated at Auckland in October, 1914.

2. In consequence of representations from the leaders of the Maori race that the Maori Force should not be divided, it was decided, in October, 1914, with the consent of the Imperial Government, to send the whole of the Maoris to Egypt for garrison duty.

3. In May, 1915, the Imperial Government suggested that the Maori Contingent should see active service. This suggestion, meeting with the approval of the New Zealand Government and the leaders of the Maori race, the Maori troops, in July, 1915, joined the New Zealand Expeditionary Force in Gallipoli.

4. The subsequent Maori Contingents were sent as reinforcements to the 1st Maori Contingent.

5. Fifty Rarotongans and 148 Niue-Islanders were included in the 3rd Maori Contingent.

6. Upon the reorganization of the New Zealand Expeditionary Force into a division in January, 1916, the Maori troops were utilized to form the Pioneer Battalion. Maori reinforcements were included in the reinforcements to this unit.

V. NEW ZEALAND ENGINEER TUNNELLING COMPANY.

1. On 12th September, 1915, the Imperial Government asked the New Zealand Government to provide an Engineer Tunnelling Company consisting of 15 officers and 325 other ranks. The New Zealand Government arranged to supply this unit, and despatched it after a period of eight weeks' training. Two officers and 104 other ranks accompanied this unit as first reinforcements.

2. In accordance with arrangements with the Imperial Government subsequent reinforcements at the rate of 60 per cent. of establishment per annum, in drafts of 2 officers and 100 other ranks, were despatched at half-yearly intervals.

3. On 4th July, 1916, the Imperial Government intimated that the establishment of all Tunnelling Companies was being increased by 5 officers and 219 other ranks, and asked the New Zealand Government if the Dominion was prepared to supply the personnel to bring the New Zealand Tunnelling Company up to the higher establishment, and provide reinforcements at a rate of 10 per cent. per month (an increase of 5 per cent. per month) of this higher establishment. It was found, however, that to provide personnel for the higher establishment and to provide reinforcements at increased rate would compromise the output of coal in the Dominion. The New Zealand Government therefore offered to provide reinforcements at the increased scale for the original establishment of the company and to despatch at quarterly intervals in lieu of half-yearly intervals. This involved the provision of 2 officers and 100 other ranks every quarter. This offer was communicated to the Imperial Government on 9th August, 1916, and was accepted.

4. Arrangements were made, however, as from 13th August, 1917 (29th Reinforcements), and onwards to despatch with each draft to the New Zealand Division 31 other ranks as additional Infantry in place of 100 Tunnellers quarterly; no further appointment of officers to be made in New Zealand.

5. On 9th May, 1917, the General Officer Commanding New Zealand Troops in the United Kingdom notified that as the New Zealand Tunnelling Company was not engaged in mining, but on road-construction, it was not considered necessary that miners be sent as reinforcements until asked for. Reinforcements were therefore arranged as additional Infantry.

6. On 12th October, 1918, a telegram was sent to the G.O.C., New Zealand Expeditionary Force, in the United Kingdom, asking whether in view of this report it was desired to cancel reinforcements for the Tunnelling Company, 31 men being sent as additional Infantry with each draft. On 15th October Brigadier-General Richardson replied that further reinforcements for the Tunnelling Company were not required.

VI. NEW ZEALAND WIRELESS TROOP.

1. On 28th December, 1915, the Indian Government asked the New Zealand Government to supply the personnel for a Pack Wireless Troop, consisting of 1 officer and 55 other ranks. The New Zealand Government arranged to provide this unit. It was despatched with the 10th Reinforcements draft on 4th March, 1916, after a period of five weeks' training. Ten per cent. of establishment (6 other ranks) accompanied the unit as first reinforcements.

2. In accordance with the expressed wishes of the Indian Government arrangements were made to despatch quarterly further reinforcements at the rate of 15 per cent. of establishment. Owing, however, to large and unforeseen wastage, due to sickness, &c., it was found impracticable to estimate requirements of reinforcements on any fixed basis. Accordingly on 3rd July, 1916, the Indian Government asked the New Zealand Government to supply 10 Wireless Operators and 8 Drivers as soon as possible. The Indian Government in the same communication also requested that reinforcements be increased from 15 per cent. per quarter to 20 per cent. per month. The New Zealand Government agreed to this proposal, and steps were taken to despatch reinforcements of 11 other ranks every four weeks, or as required by the Indian Government, in lieu of 9 other ranks every quarter.

3. The New Zealand Wireless Troop was incorporated with the Australian Wireless Troop, and designated "Australian - New Zealand Wireless Signal Squadron."

4. On 19th June, 1918, advice was received from the Indian Government that it was intended to transfer the Wireless Troop for service in France.

5. On 12th August, 1918, advice was received from the Secretary of State for the Colonies that the New Zealand personnel of the Wireless Troop had been separated from the Australian personnel, and that a transfer to France was taking place. The personnel was not to be merged into any formation in France, but to be utilized as reinforcements to the New Zealand Signal units.

6. The whole of the personnel for the Wireless Troop was found by the Post and Telegraph Department.

VII. RECRUITING.

From the commencement of the war up to October, 1915, the voluntary system of recruiting was undertaken entirely by officers of the Defence Department without assistance. Drafts of recruits were called into camp at intervals of two months. Men were not allowed to come up whenever they wished, but had to go into camp when a draft was being mobilized. From October, 1915, to February, 1916, the same voluntary system was adhered to, but drafts were called up at intervals of four weeks instead of two months. During this period voluntary assistance was rendered by Recruiting Committees at a few centres throughout the Dominion. In February, 1916, a Recruiting Board consisting of three Ministers of the Crown and a Permanent Secretary was appointed to secure the co-operation of the local authorities in the Dominion.

The Military Service Act giving powers to use compulsion where volunteers were insufficient became law on 1st August, 1916. The Act was not necessitated by any shortage of volunteers existing at that time, but by a general feeling that compulsion for all alike was more just in a democratic country than was a voluntary system.

From 27th October, 1916, to 20th September, 1917, a quota for each Reinforcement draft was allotted to each of the twenty-one Group Areas into which the military districts of the Dominion are divided. Failure to produce the required quota resulted in the application of the Military Service Act to the Group in question in order to make up the deficiency.

In September, 1917, the allocation of quotas to Groups was abandoned, the volunteers from the whole Dominion for a particular draft being pooled and the balance required being made up from a Dominion ballot.

From February, 1916, to November, 1916, the voluntary system of recruiting was continued, when the first ballot of the First Division (single men) under the Military Service Act, 1916, was held to fill vacancies in drafts. Ballots were held at regular intervals to complete drafts. In October, 1917, the first ballot for members of the Second Division (married men) was held.

The results of the ballots are published in Table XXVI.

VIII. C1 CAMP.

A camp was established at Tauherenikau in September, 1917, for men classified "C1"—i.e., likely to become fit for active service after special training. The first draft of recruits was sent to this camp 25th-28th September, 1917. The results of this camp are published in Table XXXIV.

IX. HORSES.

1. The requisite number of horses as laid down, including 10 per cent. as first reinforcements, accompanied the Main Body of the New Zealand Expeditionary Force.
2. Up to June, 1915, horses were reinforced at the following rates :—
 Horse reinforcements for all units other than riding-horses for New Zealand Mounted Rifles Brigade—70 per cent. of Establishment per annum.
 Horse (riding) reinforcements for New Zealand Mounted Rifles Brigade—One riding-horse per officer and man of Mounted Rifles Reinforcements.
3. The horses shipped with the 5th Reinforcements were disembarked in India on account of losses sustained through the monsoon season, and further shipments of horses were cancelled temporarily.
4. In December, 1915, the Imperial Government requested that 2,000 to 3,000 horses should be shipped before the end of March, 1916. This was accordingly done.
5. Further horse reinforcements were not taken from New Zealand on account of shortage of shipping.

X. TERRITORIAL FORCES.

In addition to the provision and maintenance of her Expeditionary Forces in the field, New Zealand continued the training of her Territorial and Cadet Forces under the Defence Act, 1909. The training, however, naturally suffered with the progress of the war on account of depletion of equipment and men from the Dominion (*vide* Table XXVIII).

In consequence of the removal of the New Zealand Division from Egypt to France, also the removal of the base of the New Zealand Division from Egypt to the United Kingdom, the Imperial Government requested that all future reinforcements to the New Zealand Division be sent to England, and that reinforcements to the New Zealand Mounted Rifles be sent to Egypt as heretofore. Arrangements were made by the New Zealand Government accordingly. The altered routes necessitated the diversion at sea of transports "Willochra" and "Tofua," conveying the 13th Reinforcements to the New Zealand Division, several days out from Albany. 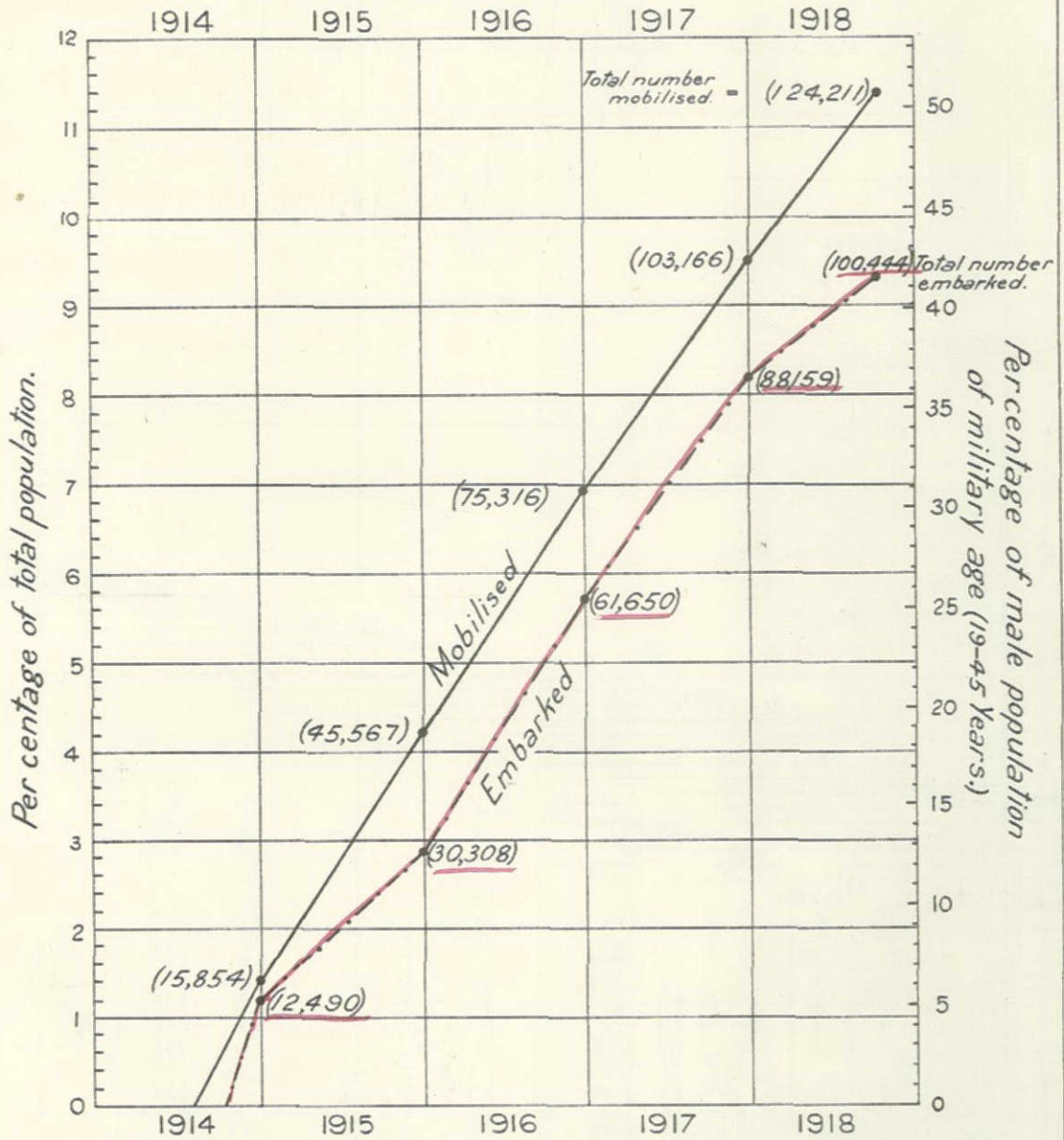
