The funeral took place at the Linwood Cemetery on Saturday afternoon in the presnce of a numerous concourse of mourners. A largelyattended service was previously held in St. Peter's Church, when the Revs. Dr Elmslie,

was removed from the church. An impreswas removed from the church. An impressive service at the grave was subsequently conducted by the Revs. Dr Erwin and Frederick Stubbs. Many beautiful wreaths were laid upon the coffin, sent by the Kaiapoi and St. Peter's congregations, with which Mrs Gow had been connected, and by the Sunday schools, choirs, and various other friends. The deceased lady, who has passed away at the early age of 44, and who was greatly esteemed for her devout and amiable character, was the daughter of the late Mr R. Taylor, of Invercargill, and has left behind four young children. Very great sympathy is felt for the bereaved husband. The late Mrs Gow was, during the last few years of her life, frequently invalided. Her home duties also claimed so much of her strength and attention that she did not become so intimately acquainted with all the people of the church as she wished. She was a most devoted wife and mother. Hers was a strong as well as a sympathetic character, presenting the rather rare union in one personality of much firmness with great gentleness and tenderness of feeling. Usefulness, tender-heartedness, and other of the noblest womanly virtues were combined with sound common sense, and an unswerving loyalty to principle. When sure of her position on any question of principle, her attitude was strongly uncompromising. Her qualities of head and heart were such as to incline those in trouble to lean on her, and all to admire her.
