Mrs. Joughim passed away in the early hours of Christmas Day. She had been in indifferent health for a great part of the year but at the last the call came suddenly, after but a few hours' illness. She survived her husband a little less than a year and was laid to rest beside him in the Hillsborough Cemetery, the services in the home and at the graveside being conducted by Dr. C. H. Laws.
