Doar Colonel Dittmor
I am vory much obligod to you fox yurn lettor, which came to hand last rook. I have takon the liborty of circulating it among our people, and I found on arriving hore, that a copy had apneared in the Morning Rost. I am sure that our pooplo at home hore rill feol as I do, that no greator homoult could have been dono the officers and mon of the battalion than this approciation by thoir Commanding officer.

In the Moord menner wo, the relatives and tribos of the men under your commad, have appropriated to ourselves the glory of your achiovemonts and the immonse satisfaction and polief in knowing, that they have looked the worst dangers face to face Fithout flinching. I never doubted the bravery of youx Maori leds, knoving tho stock they woro descondod from, but I did have some misgivings about thelr ability to face tho shodds of the ternible meapons so muthlessly usod by the onemy. Could they stand up to theso, where so many of the soldiers of Europan nations had tumod away in torror? The cablod roports dispolled one'g anxlety on that score, and you can roalise the doop satisfaction throughout the morf. rorld as the news came from many sourcos of the prowess of the rat lads from Meoriland. Many an -1der, Tho had decried the degeneration of the race, has had to rovise his valuation. It was the chorus of praiso from Tmperial, Australian, Nev Zoaland and oven American sources, which gave us comfort even as wo read the casualty lists and grievod over sons killod or knocked sbout or missing.

It was very difficult for rolativos, pakeha or Mari, or in other rords for Now Zealend to realiso what the hectic speod of the operations implied in the mattor of offleial nerrs of the fortunes of thoir boys. Th mumerous casen the official bulletin that 2 man was reported missing was proceded or inmodiatoly followed by a cable from the man himself, reporting his safety. It was not known have until many days on weeks later, that the privata coble ( undatod and not shoving placo of origin) mas sent from Crete and referrod to a safe evacuation from Grooce, but that the official moesage rolatod to ovents in Crote. Thus ye had on a Sunday a roport from the Ministom of Dofence announcing Arnold Roedy as missing, while the noxt morning came a cable from Reedy, "Safe but lost overything". Well into June his mothor and relatives believed that Arnold vas safe thth you in Egypt. Subsequent enquiriss by H. Q. unfortunstoly laft no doubt that ho had not roturned. With the rest.

Wo serovery gind to bave your testimony of the quality of the officers, who have had thaix baptism of fire. Wo extend to thom our heartiolt congratulations, whilo sympathising with them and yourself on the loss of their follov officers and compades. All tiat wes sald Thilo you wore still with us, the flowor of haori youth, the futurg laadors of the race, was omplasised as we folloned you to Eagland, watched the intensive training there and the Impationt waiting by the English Channel Thon came the Ing speli in the New Yoar when you passed out of our haaring to omerge at your original destination on the eve of the great sdventure. Whether in Greeoe ox in Crote wo wondere Whother our confidence in your qualitios of leadorship would bo justifiod, for so much doponded on those in the generations shead. So the testimony of your Commanding officor brings to us a doop satisfaction and prido.

Lady Ngata and I hace pasd our rospect to the reletivas of George To Kuru and Horton Stewart. In tho Cormor Hawkes Bey hes lost its most promising young leador, whoso example in this war has inspired a groater response from his own poople of Porsngahatu then from any other part of the East Coast south of Gisborne. My firgt wifo and I brought up Horton's father and sav him through Te Auto College. I montion these two lads
spocially bocmuso I kan them snd their people botter than in the case of the othor officers reported kiliod in action. We grieve with you for them and for the sacrifice of such promising ilves. It is pitifully tragio that the insane ambition of one man should have had such repercussions in this farmoff land and anong a poople that does not fully grasp the issues involved in the present moxld conflict.

And Himeding LexI- until your lottor came we had from lettors recoivod from officors and mon, snd statoments made by mon inve11ded home, satisfiod ourselves that he lost his lifo in crote. Wo in the south hore more about to visit his wife snd poople at Hokdanga, having hoard thet at tang was in progross thoro for this outstanding figure in our Maori morld. This in spite of the official roport, that he is 'missing'. Your lottor raises a faint hoyo, that ho might, like Watty MoKay, who was reported so badly wounded as to heve had little chance of surviving his wounds, turm up as a prisoner of wax. I lenew the saerifice this man made in orcier to load his poople of Hoklanga to enlist. And having succoeded in thet object ho folt ho would be letting thom down if he did not go oversess with thom. If it is sny satisfaction to his tribesmon, his fellow officers and firiends in the baltalion, thoy should lnow that Flarding has dreinod the man porrer of hokianga dry or almost so, and that he continues to inspire other sections of Ngapuhi and associated tribos of tho Horth. If the worst hus happoned then Herding met his fato in the way his marlike ancestors doomed the most honourable, losding his own tribesmen into battle.

In theis momory nud that of the fellov officers, pakeha and Haori, and of the men who foll with thom wo in the citios and villages of their native land stand in sorrom at the many maraes which will not soo them again. Duping the many wooks as the casualty ises dribbled through it was poor comport to the bereavod pelatives thet tho Pakohn world admired and applaudod the conduct and achiovements of the battalion. Your casualties were so distributed over the length and breedth of the mioxi territory, thet sorrowing commities could not see the honour and glory through thelr fonxs. The Pakeha's praise could not quite sssusge their griof. It needod the mossagos from those who survived, the first hand wecounts of mon who have returned. and now yous sobar testimony to convince them, that their lads have attained to somethine praiserrorthy. I should say hore that nothing plenses us more then the absence of 'skite' in the 1etters recoived. Prom mombers of the battalion. The same may be said of the accounts we have had from men invalided home. Offi cer and mon have looked into a world, where they have seon visions to sober them.

I feel greatly honoured that you have writton to mo as you have. I bhenk you for your notos sbout my two sons, and for the knowleare that they axpned the esteom of theix commanding officer and follow officers. Ere this you vill have heard that Honry and the others axe prisenors of wav in Gormany. This good nevs was sccompanied by $a$ cable from the High Commissioner that they wore getting on very well. Wenry, woorge Bennett, Jimuy Williams, Hokianga, Herewint, Tonga Rangi vere montionod in one 1ist, then came Wetty NeKay's name. The names of s fev of the privades have also appeared and you may bo sure that anzious wives, mothors and othor rolativos aro anxiously waiting for advice from the Minister of Defenco. Jinmy Williams: father Was most anxious to get to the Middlo Basit to look for his son. Poor old chap, Iiving at Lake Ohia he innocently belioved the porld would bo safe for his sorph. My om people suggested I might be more userully employed as an observer with the bettalion to send home intimate xccounts of their beloved onest

Willie with Waks Clarke and Tu Manahi and I3 men came home
in the mangenui. His leg wound healed nicely on board, but he looked a wreck with tov arms in plastor and a face torribly pinchod. He made for Hastings the day 2 Ctor landing, and has made vory good procress. Fie is now able to fend himself and to mito. The right arm is hoaling up a bit out of shape, but with use it might do quite vell. He is vory keen to rosume soldjring,
and I hope he will be fit onough to take a hand in training some of the reinforcements. Bishop Bonnott and. I thoroughly enjoyed his account of the doings of the battalion. He writes that he V111 bo strong onough to Visit the East Coast via Wairoa and Gisbome noxt week, where the people are looking formard to e Pirst hand account from a participetor in the riphting.

Wake hes bee round from Gisborne to the Bay of Plenty, at the invitation of the tribes there. I met him in Auckland and visited the camp at Papakura vith him. He was to have under.. gone an operation last Wednesdey. If successíul he may be useful as a pecruiting officer or for our Home Gused. Th Handis has done the rounds of the villegos in the Hot Laves District and given very interosting pecounts of the sea journoyings of the battalion and tho training in Bagland. On mill bands I find ovidence of the doep interest stirred by the visits of these officors.

Wellington, Aug. T4th: This evening cones official advice that Arnold Roedy 18 mong the prisonexs of war. His mothor has moreied horself into hospital ovor him, but the good news will cheor hor buck to health.

The suspense hes been very trying to the womon folk. Poor Herowini's mothor committed sulefde only a short while before nows came of hor sonds safoty.

स. Q. bas given mo the figures of tho casualties, which bear out the experience in other thestres that reekconed in killed this war is mich leas destmetive of the lives of soldier than the inst. But it sooms more dondiy in snother respoct, by loss of effectives as prtsoners. The return doss not shpw the loss from sicknoss leading to mon boing sent home, although we heve the numbar of those who died of sickness. We had expected for the Haris a much heavier prete of sickness, espocielily in tho onviromment and climate of Foypt, but the linistor is very ploasod with the good health of the heori unit.

Wo are marasing to keap pace with the densands for reinforce monts, and as far nas can be poreseen we sxe sssured of mon finto noxt yoar. As far as a layman can judge the quality is not noticonbly dotoriorating, and that soom to be the opinion of the instructional stalf. Recruiting, which languished somewhet in the Iate auturm and early part or the vinter, took a spuxt Whon nows came of the battalion's showing. Gasual ties, which affectod evmry tribe and district, introdneed the additional motive of "vengeanco', a most poverful one in the old days. You vill find in subsequont jxenta brothers snd olose rolatives of mon reported killed, or wounded or missing, all eager to do theif bitt to make good the loss of men poter.

Gompuision is out of the question, ithough teibes which we being drainod ox thoir young men ask for this in their rasentment that neighbouring tribes do not realise their responsibilities. The historicel oxperience of many tribes in the last IOO years rosult in the uneven response, whlch your Mard officers fully understand. Wo hope hovever that msasures now beine token will sprosd the sacrifice more equitably. Your rocoxds ovoraess will toll you betterthan I can whore your roinfoxcemonts are coming irom, and I can sssuxe that their commanities will do their utmost to see that your strength is $\mathrm{k} / \mathrm{k}$ rapt up.

Iread your paragrph about the 'buit or fosst aftor you had. sottlod down aftor Creto with $x$ pang. Apart from rolatives! parcels and parcols sent through tho Patrictic Board wo have tried to get to you the kind of 'ka 1' that your boys would appreciate at your foregetherfags. A Iarge consignment oit buttex wes dospatched to Kngland before wo knem that you were within a fow weoks of coming to the Hicidle East. Othor specisl foods intonded for Xmas were held up for shipping. We sent preserved kumare, poric and beef, some driod paua with or woout the semo time as the pelnforcements, which should hove reached you before this.

We do our best to patch together from the boy's letters what their private requiroments are. There would be an wider response in xegard to thest, and also your common fund and the more important matter of recrulting if concorted appasis could be broadeast from your end ov or the sir, or by cablo or letter. In regard to recruiting I have suggested to the pubhorities, that it would ba a good thing if selectod officers and men in the fore could aond s.0.s. messages by radio. There tas a brief one by Wowobia whon you landad in England Ias多 year. that had a very real apperl and the prople still romember it and wonder why more of that sort of thing is not done. I am sure that broadcast appeal by carefully solectod men from the distriets, which up to nov have not mosponded as they might, will be vory holpful to us horo. They should bo in Maoxi by masters in their respoctive dislects who need not be offleass. A spectal offort in this direction from members of the battalion would be well worth whilo.

As to the bettalion fund the only adistional contribution to that from tho Hest Coast was from King Koroki, thaich I hope has peachod you. I an expocts.ng a contribution from the whanganui district and also North Auckland. I am glad to has that you still have a. belenco.

I hato loit to this concluding paragweh commonts of a personal nature, which aro besed on lettors from the front and statements irom mon who have come back to us. Theso speak in emphasic terms of your splondid and unienititing efforts to bring the bettalion to the highest point of officiency and to instil the hish discipline, which hes boon so vell commended by mombers of othemnits or the $\mathbb{N}$.Z.E.F. and the Austrolians, and which has surbled you to go through the xecent strenous trials and to come out of thom with unirapaled disalyline. I undergtinn that officers and men did not alynys appove the soverities of the training, but now a clanovlouge that but for it the 1 ngses might havo been vorse without schioving thw distinction now attaching to the Sonec.

Lady iggatw thanks you for your kind wishes. If Peddy Whito Is 96117 with you as dospatch rider his grimadmothere sonds him hor taroha ' and that of his many polativos. Thoy mre glad to howr Ixom Willio that he is Tinli.

We wish you, and tho officens snd men under your command and thoso of the reinforomonts now in the Middre Hast success, $^{2}$ good healta and under the ppotection of Gode sare rotirm to your home land.
